Farm Questions

Q. When should small grains be harvested for hay?

A. The best time to mow small grains for hay, says E. C. Blair, Extension agronomist of State College is when they are in the dough stage. When the hay has wilted it should be raked into windrows and cured one or two days in the windrow or in piles. In the Piedmont section, small grains are usually mature for hay between May 15 and June 1.

Q. What is a good growing mash for chicks?

A. The poultry specialists at State College recommend a growing mash composed of 25 pounds of No. 2 yellow corn meal, 20 pounds of standard wheat middlings, 20 pounds of No. 2 heavy oats finely pulverized, 12 pounds of standard wheat bran, 4 pounds of fish meal (55 percent protein), 2 pounds of meat meal (55 percent protein), 2 pounds of dried skim milk or buttermilk, 2 pounds of ground limestone or oyster shell, 2 pounds of bone meal, and 1 pound of a salt mixture (made by mixing 12 1-2 lbs of common salt with 3.4 ounces of anhydrous manganese sulfate).

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
