Neutral Fertilizers Increase Yields of Potatoes And Cotton

Plots of Irish potatoes, sweet potatoes and cotton that have received neutral fertilizers have consistently out-yielded those receiving acid fertilizers. In tests made by the North Carolina Extension Service, says E. C. Blair, Extension agronomist at State College.

With sweet potatoes, the returns from neutralizing the fertilizer increased as the potash was increased in the mixture. These increases were 3.7 bushels to the acre for three per cent more potash; 11.1 bushels for six per cent more potash and 14.2 bushels for nine per cent more potash, Mr. Blair reports.

Neutralizing fertilizers with dolomitic limestone, in similar tests, has increased the average yields of Irish potatoes as much as 32 bushels to the acre. Basic fertilizers have produced increases up to 46 bushels, Mr. Blair adds.

The results of tests for three successive years with acid, neutral and basic fertilizers applied on the same plots have indicated no potato scab infestation resulting from the neutral or basic fertilizers.

Cotton yields, in the same experiments, have shown increases of more than a half-bale to the acre by the use of neutral fertilizer.

Yields of Irish potatoes in Bladen fine, sandy loam were increased 33 bushels to the acre by the use of neutral fertilizer, over the yields of potatoes which received acid fertilizer. In Norfolk sandy loam the neutral fertilizer brought an increased cotton yield of 266 pounds to the acre over cotton produced with acid mixtures.

Farm Questions

Q. Is crotalaria a good crop to be used with corn

A. E. C. Blair, State College Extension Service agronomist, says that corn grown in alternate years in rotation with crotalaria at the Lower Coastal Plain Branch Station at Willard produced an average yield of 39 bushels per acre as compared with a yield of 23 bushels produced by continuous corn. When a corn-crotalaria rotation was used, the corn yields dropped to an average of 29.5 bushels per acre and nearly all of the increase was obtained in the first year following crotalaria.

Q. How closely can soybeans be grazed?

A. Dan Holler, county agent at large of the State College Extension Service, advises that all the leaves of the plants may be grazed off once every 30 days and here still will be good yields of soybeans and enough seed to plant the next year's crop. If all leaves are eaten off every 10 to 20 days, the total yield is sharply reduced.
