Durham, Aug. 30.—In a prominent bridal of interest to North Carolina society, Miss Charlotte Boyd Markham of this city, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Blackwell Markham, was wed to Tolly Martin Shuford of Kings Mountain, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Shuford of Blacksburg, S. C., in a formal ceremony in St. Philip's Episcopal church.

Rev. David W. Yates, rector of St. Philip's church, was the officiating minister. The altar of the church was decorated with Mexican tree ferns and with cathedral candles in the candelabra, and the altar vases were filled with California asters and eupatorium. Clusters of Maid of Orleans gladioli tied with French tulle were placed at intervals down the aisle.

Miss Alice Hundley, organist, and a mixed quartet composed of Mrs. J. Foster Barnes, Miss Mary Eleanor Krummel, C. S. Hooper, Jr., and W. M. Upchurch, Jr., rendered the nuptial music.

The bride's attendants included her sister, Miss Eleanor Markham, who was maid of honor; another sister, Miss Sarah Markham, who with Mrs. J. S. Wilhelm of Allendale, S. C., sister of the bridegroom Mrs. Robert T. Ivey of Durham, and Miss Kathryn Montague of Durham served as bridesmaids; Little Anne Hackney, her cousin, who was junior bridesmaid; and Margaret Shuford Wilhelm, niece of the bridegroom, who served as flower girl.
