**Bittliffe Promoted Staff Sergeant**

U. S. Army Man Bittliffe who has served the U. S. Army since June 2, 1924, became Staff Sergeant at Fort Knox, Ky. Oct. 15, 1941.

Staff Sergeant Bittliffe enlisted at Providence, Rhode Island. He was transferred first to Fort Slocum, New York, and then to Fort Randolph, to the 1st Coast Artillery Band at Fort Sherman on the Panama Canal Zone.

After two years his enlistment expired and therefore was discharged at Brooklet Army Base, New York, reenlisting at Whitehall St.

a station transferred to the 10th U. S. Army Infantry Band at Fort Thomas, Ky. Eighteen months later he was transferred to the 12th Infantry Band at Fort Devens, Mass. While on assignment at Plattsburg, New York, he was transferred with the entire 12th Infantry to the Greene Area, next to the 14th Infantry at Fort Davis on the Panama Canal. This made his second tour of duty in Foreign Service. When this enlistment expired he was discharged at Fort Monmouth, N. J.

On January 28, 1941 he was called back into service as a Regular Army Reserve with the post of Pl. Knox, Kentucky. From February to May after long hours of learning and handling Military correspondence he became the Chief of the Message Center and Files in the Group 2 Headquarters at the Armor Force Replacement Training Center.

His duties now are at the 11th Armored Replacement Battalion as Sergeant Major of the 11th Battalion. In four more months he will have served 7 full years of service in the Army of the United States. Staff Sgt. Bittliffe is the husband of the former Virginia Alota Stewart of the Dixon community who is now visiting her parents. The Herald congratulates the Army man on his promotion.
