Uncle Sam To Visit Every Farmer In State

The man with the stove-pipe hat and the white whiskers — known to Americans as "Uncle Sam" — will visit every farmer in North Carolina between now and about December 1. He will drop around to ask each farmer how much food and feed he can, and will produce to help "Win the War and Write of the legendary National hero.
 The details of the house to house canvass, by means of which the food and feed production drive will be conducted, are being worked out at regional, county and community meetings of agricultural and rural welfare leaders. The Triple-A committee, who are the elected leaders of the farmers, will obtain the pledges necessary to meet the county goals of more food and feed next year.
 Regional, educational and training meetings are scheduled Monday October 20, at Elizabeth City, Clinton, Raleigh, Lexington, and Waynesville, and on Tuesday October 21 at New Bern, Henderson, Rockingham, Shelby and Wilkesboro. County and community meetings will follow as soon thereafter as they can be arranged.

N. C. Farmers Asked To Grow More Oats, Barley

Plant more oats and barley, and less wheat this fall, says the United States Government to North Carolina farmers anxious to cooperate in the "Food for Freedom" campaign which has just been started on a Nation-wide basis.
 E. C. Blair, Extension agronomist of N. C. State College, reports that North Carolina's 1942 food and feed goals in the emergency program calls for 200,000 acres of oats, 40,000 acres of barley, and 265,000 acres of wheat. These production goals compare with 200,000 acres of oats, 20,000 acres of barley, and 400,000 acres of wheat harvested in 1941.
 We are asked, Blair said, to double our barley acreage, increase our oat acreage by 40,000 acres, and to put down on our wheat production 122,000 acres. A further reduction of wheat is asked in 1942.
 The agronomist said there is little time to lose in making plans to meet these goals. Unfortunately he stated, the past few weeks have been dry, making it difficult for farmers to prepare their grain land. When the rain does come, do not lose an hour until your small grain

Winter Peas Worth More Than \$3 Per Acre Payment
 Thousands of North Carolina farmers are sowing Austrian winter peas this fall in order to complete their AAA soil building units. They hope eventually to receive a payment of \$3 per acre for tending and the legume.
 E. C. Blair, Extension agronomist of N. C. State College, says the far sighted farmer will sow winter peas even though he has earned all his Triple-A soil building units. They pay far more than the \$3 per acre government payment he is offered.
 Using tests carried out by farmers in 1941 as the basis for his statement, Blair said that winter peas turned under in the spring will increase the yield of corn that follows as a summer crop by \$12 worth per acre.
 Faced with a declining supply of available workers, farmers have been able to keep their hired men this fall only by sharp increasing farm wage rates.
