Charlotte, Nov. 2.—Five Charlotte hospitals were officially approved by the Standardization Conference of the American College of Surgeons which was held in Boston this morning. The institutions were contained in a list of 2,872 approved hospitals in the United States.

They are: The Charlotte Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital, Charlotte Memorial Hospital, Charlotte Sanatorium, Mercy Hospital and Presbyterian Hospital.

Memorial was cited, in addition, as qualified for the training of internes.

Hospitals must meet ten basic standards to be approved by the College of Surgeons.

London, Nov. 2.—King George of Greece is planning to visit the United States, probably with a considerable entourage. It was reported today that it was still that the visit possibly might be made within a few weeks, and that its length was indefinite.

Merchants' Directors Meet With Town Officials

The Board of Directors of the Kings Mountain Merchants' Association met with City Manager H. L. Burdette and Chief of Police Jimmy Duff Thursday night in the City Hall. The City Officials asked that the merchants place all garbage in outside containers at closing time to be picked up by city trucks. There is a city ordinance to this effect, and merchants are asked to cooperate with city officials so that this ordinance will not have to be enforced.

The Board voted unanimously to rent the vacant lot of the Little Goforth Estate to be used as free parking for customers buying in Kings Mountain. The Board also voted to ask all merchants and employees to park personal cars at back of their business places so that customers can use streets for parking so as to make it pleasant for people to shop in Kings Mountain.

Workmen are now busy getting the lot ready for parking and President H. C. McClain stated that he thought it would be ready for the public Saturday.

Details plans are being made to eliminate rats from local stores. The Association is getting assistance from state authorities and will have a survey made soon and an estimate of the cost.

Members H. L. Smith, Byron Ector, Glen Bridges, Charles Thompson, and Harry Page have been appointed to make plans to bring Santa Claus to town at the beginning of Christmas coming season.

Employment Office Installed Here

A representative of the North Carolina State Employment Service Office at Shelby is at the City Hall in Kings Mountain each Tuesday for the purpose of registering all people who are out of work and who would like to have the assistance of the Employment Office in obtaining work. All skilled workers who are available for work should register at office, as skilled workers are in great demand for defense work.

The Employment Service is especially interested in assisting all young high school graduates and returned soldiers who are unemployed to find employment. The representative would be glad to assist house wives of Kings Mountain and vicinity, who are in need of mending and cooks, or other domestic help. Several cents and made from this vicinity are now available for work. Students and business people who will need clerical help or sales people for the fall trading season will please contact the representative at the City Hall on Tuesdays, or the State Employment Office in Shelby, telephone 729, on other days. Suitable applicants will be sent promptly for interview.

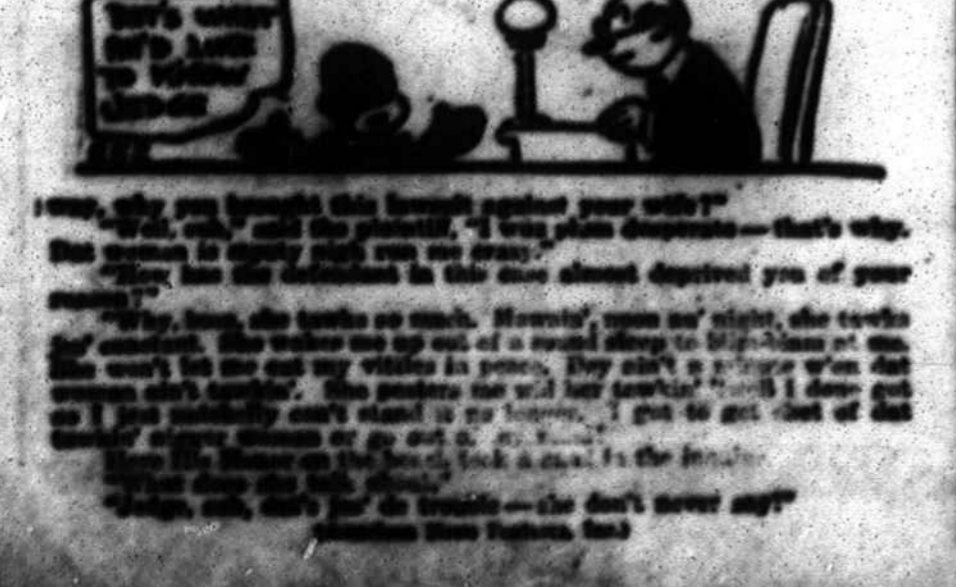

Observation Post To Be Manned Nov. 15-20

The Kings Mountain Observation Post for the spotting and reporting of military aircraft has been asked to have its tower manned from November 15 to November 20, which is the period of the most active maneuvers of the two armies in North and South Carolina. It has also been asked to be on duty on November 22, which has been designated as Test Day.

Previously, the hours on duty have been from 6:00 A. M. to 6:00 P. M. but during the coming period they will be from 5:00 A. M. to 6:00 P. M.

There are several other changes in the reporting of planes, the principal ones being that single planes will be reported, and that the color of the cross appearing on them will be given. These crosses will be either red or white.

This Post has also been given the task of reporting the weather every two hours. This will be the only post in Cleveland County to give this report.

This post has been contacted personally by Army Officers engaged in this work, and those in charge are very anxious that the splendid work done by our spotters last month will even be excelled during the coming period.

81 Arrests Made During October

During the month of October, 1941, there was a total of 78 persons arrested in three instances one person was charged with more than one offense making a total of 81 charges. A list of the arrests and charges follows, as released by Chief of Police Jimmy Burns:

Assault 2; Assault with a Deadly Weapon 2; Bench Warrant 1; Capital 1; Carrying a Concealed Weapon 1; Deserter U. S. Army 2; Disorderly Conduct 1; Drunkenness 25; Fornication and Adultery 2; Hit and Run 2; Investigation 2; Larceny 8; Non-Support 2; Operating Automobile Intoxicated 4; Reckless Driving 2; Speeding 7; Vagrancy 1; Violating Prohibition Law 2; Violating Traffic Laws 1.

Investigations were made in the following instances but no arrests were made:

Door to Place of Business Open 1; Forger 2; Theft of Automobile 2; Wreck 2.

It will be noted that although appropriate warnings have been issued in the Herald pertaining to speeding the number of arrests on this charge is quite high when compared with other charges. The Police Department hopes these warnings will be heeded in the future, eliminating the necessity of making arrests for this offense.

Are Darkened Here Signs and Show Windows

As non-essential lights were turned out Tuesday night and up-town Kings Mountain was plunged into partial darkness as commercial users of electricity began prompt compliance with an order issued to individual businessmen last night by City Manager H. L. Burdette.

The town was required to send out notices of prohibited use of electricity in compliance with a limitation order issued to Washington by Donald H. Nelson, Director of priorities, Office of Production Management.

With particular reference to commercial users, the order prohibits excessive here, certain non-essential users of electricity. The complete list of such prohibited uses is as follows:

(1) Sign lighting, (2) show window lighting, (3) outline and ornamental lighting, (4) outdoor lighting, flood lighting or field lighting for amusements or sports, (5) interior or exterior lighting for decorative or advertising purposes.

These prohibited uses do not include (1) ordinary street or traffic lighting, (2) signal or other lighting required by police, fire or other safety department, nor (3) lighting for defense property protection required by defense regulations.

Virtually all Kings Mountain show windows, theater fronts and electrical and neon signs were darkened last night, with a few exceptions. No further night football games are scheduled in this section.

Under the order both the business firm and the electrical system are held responsible for the individual's prompt compliance with its terms.

Former Kings Mtn. Woman Buried in Abbeville

Mrs. Madden of Miami, Fla., to fore-mother Miss Eleanor Gambrell, who spent her childhood and a part of her young womanhood days in Kings Mountain, died in Miami during the latter part of October, after a lingering illness from brain tumor.

Mrs. Madden has many friends in Kings Mountain who mourn her untimely death.

Funeral services were held in Miami and interment took place in Abbeville, S. C. where her father resides.

Surviving are the husband and two young sons; her father, George Gambrell; a sister, Mrs. Tom McKittrick, known in Kings Mountain as Miss May Gambrell.

Mrs. Madden's mother, who was before marriage Miss May McLanahan, was a native of Kings Mountain and died here when her children were quite young.

Will Rogers' Humorous Story

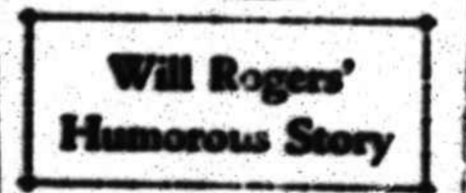

Washington Snapshots

Washington is giving a lot of belated attention these hectic days to the problem of the small businessman.

On September 4, the President appointed Floyd D. Odlum to head a Division of Contract Distribution for the OPE. Mr. Odlum, after a rapid survey of the situation in which the small businessman found himself, said his job should have been started six months or maybe a year before. Some 20,000 small industries turned to almost war production, and he's determined to prevent that kind of dislocation resulting from almost defense hush if he can.

Mr. Odlum has taken on a job of gigantic proportions. He's up against the fact that neither the Army nor Navy people believe small business and defense can be mixed. They look upon the subcontracting program as a type of "relief," necessary politically, but a thorn in the side of defense. The big companies, having patriotically accepted contracts forced upon them by government demand, are being accused of hogging the work which actually government officials should have
