N. C. Cotton Report

November 1, 1941

Good autumn weather further boosted prospects for North Carolina 1941 cotton crop, according to reports from farmers to the Crop Reporting Service. The November harvest placed the 1941 yield per acre at 125 pounds, an increase of 10 percent over a month ago and the third highest per acre yield on record although 84 pounds below last year.

Total production is estimated at 55,000 bales, 25 percent less than the 1940 harvest and 12 percent up over the ten-year (1930-39) average output. This is the third smallest crop since 1907.

With rainfall decided, excellent and temperatures above average since late July, the cotton crop has improved steadily each month. Fall weather has been ideal for picking and ginning. Farmers report approximately 85 percent of the crop ginned as of November 1st, the highest in record for this date. The highest prices in many years plus favorable weather and a relatively small total crop have been the factors responsible for the high percentage ginned.

A substantial movement in prospects during October is reported in the Piedmont where the crop fell off to an unfavorable start as the result of early drought and excessive rains during July. Yields are turning out exceptionally well in the northeastern counties of the State, but are reported below average in most southern counties from Anson eastward because of severe soil damage early in the season.
