Farm-Home Week And 4-H Short Course Canceled

Shortages of transportation and labor have led to the cancellation of Farm and Home Week and 4-H Short Course, annual events on the State College summer calendar. It was announced by Dean I. O. Schaub, director of the Extension Service. He also mentioned the fact that housing accommodations at the college this summer will be another problem, due to the fact that N. C. State is on a "war-time basis" and will be used to train 1,000 or more technological students.

"One of the main factors in reaching this decision," Dean Schaub said, "is the matter of transportation. With the very critical situation as regards rubber, and the rationing of gasoline which will become effective May 15, the question of transportation became a major factor. Already bus and rail facilities are running at capacity and quite often public utilities have to cancel regular schedules in order to take care of troop movements.

"The matter of labor on the farm is likewise of great importance. Agriculture is called upon to produce more than ever before with a decided decrease in available labor. Consequently, it is felt that many in our people would feel it their patriotic duty to remain at home to assist in agricultural production rather than attend meetings of this kind.

Dean Schaub said, however, that the County 4-H club encampments at White Lake and Swan Lake will be carried out as planned. He said that most of these, and other county encampments of farm people, will be "defense camps, and the part that rural citizens can play in National Defense will be stressed."

Dahlias Will Grow In Most Sections of N. C.

Any soil that will grow good vegetables will grow good dahlias, says James G. Weaver, State College horticulturist. Therefore, he declared, dahlias can be grown in almost every section of North Carolina and no flower is more beautiful in the late summer garden.

Weaver says that dahlias should be planted immediately in the Piedmont and mountain sections. In the eastern part of the State they may be planted a month later and will bloom satisfactorily with favorable growing conditions.

The idea is, he says, to plant early enough for the dahlias to be ready to flower when the nights turn cool in the late summer. The blooms do not reach perfection during the hot summer months.

Enriched Flour Costs Only 20c Extra Per Year

It is possible to "buy health for only 20 cents extra per year," says Miss Mary Thomas, Extension nutritionist of N. C. State College. That is the additional cost of enough "enriched" flour to feed a person for a year, she explained.

The word "enriched," as used on bags of flour and on loaves of bread, is not a commercial advertising slogan, Miss Thomas explained. It is a term prescribed by the Federal Drug and Food Administration to designate flour and bread to which have been restored, collectively, the most needed nutrients of whole wheat. Enriched flour and bread is endorsed by the highest Government authorities.

It costs 5 cents, or less per 20-pound sack to enrich flour, Miss Thomas explained, and only about 100 pounds of flour are needed annually to feed the average person.

The enrichment feature of this National health program is unique in low cost per capita. The nutritionist declared. While all the bread and flour in the country can be enriched for about 20 cents per person per year, an extra glass of milk a day will cost about \$10, an extra egg or an orange 60 to \$10, an extra quarter of a pound of fresh beef 25c.

Miss Thomas also emphasized the fact that enriched bread and flour is not medicine. It is simply and merely what are removed from white flour and bread in the milling and baking processes. Taste just exactly like ordinary white flour and bread. But there is a big difference in the nutritive value of the products.

The State College horticulturist suggested that a well drained site be selected for dahlias in light sandy soil, one root may be planted six or seven inches deep, while in heavy clay soils they should be spaced for to five inches below the surface. The hole should be well prepared, especially in heavy soil, it is 12 inches across and 12 inches deep, and fill it to the corners with pulverized top soil. A handful of bone meal mixed with this soil will aid the growth of the young plant.

Weaver said, in continuing, that the root should be placed horizontally on the prepared soil in the hole with the eye on the end facing upward. Then it should be covered with good soil. In light soil, the hole may be tilled one-half full and soil added to the plant as it grows. In clay soils, the hole should be tilled completely because otherwise the water would stand in the half filled hole in rainy weather and this is not good for these young plants.
