HOEY-MORRISON We started to write an editorial on the Hoey-Morrison U. S. Senate campaign, but the thoughts expressed in the Gastonia Gazette editorial are our sentiments exactly, so we'll just reprint it.

DISAPPOINTING The definite announcement from Cameron Morrison that he will run for the U. S. Senate against Clyde Hoey, already announced some months ago will undoubtedly bring forth a feeling of disappointment even if it outright resentment on the part of thousands.

Mr. Hoey announced that he would oppose Bob Reynolds, in answer to a widespread appeal from the voters of North Carolina. After delegation from many sections appeared before Mr. Hoey to ask him to make the race against Reynolds to rid North Carolina of this man in the Senate, the Shelby man debated the matter for many weeks before yielding to the pressure from the public. He was not anxious to run for the Senate and we do not believe he would have consented to make the race, if he had not thought there would be only a minor contest. He is not anxious to engage in any primary battles. He was answering a call from the public, because he has no overweening political ambitions.

On the other hand, Mr. Morrison, elected to a seat in the House, has had ample opportunity to serve in Washington. If he is genuinely interested in serving his county, he can do so in the House. But, he wants a bigger seat. He wants more personal glory and acclaim. He wants to be the senator. Why did he not announce against Bob Reynolds before it was known that Reynolds would not run again? He could have beat Suncombe Bob and, in doing so, he would have gained some sort of satisfaction for the defeat administered by Reynolds some years back.

With all due respect for Mr. Morrison, his career as a public servant and, particularly, his services to North Carolina as governor, we do believe he is making a mistake in announcing for the Senate when Clyde Hoey has already announced. There has been no public clamor for Morrison as there was for Mr. Hoey. Cameron Morrison is endeavoring to satisfy his own selfish ambition. We do not think that he will be of any more service in the U. S. Senate than he was in the House. We have not heard or read of anything spectacular or outstanding he did in the House, except to vote faithfully and religiously along party lines, even against many of his colleagues.

We do not believe he can beat Mr. Hoey, but we are sorry that he has entered the race at this late hour, and also for the fact that his entry will cause Mr. Hoey to spend more time and money than would have been necessary had he been unopposed by any other than Arthur Simmons of Burlington, and Marvin Birch, of Charlotte.
