Give Hogs Good Mineral Mixtures

The amount of pork produced by a certain given quantity of feed will depend on how well balanced the feed is, says F. H. Smith, nutritionist with the animal industry department of the State College Experiment Station.

He points out that the feed should contain protein of good quality, carbohydrates, minerals and vitamins, and that it should be properly fed for maximum pork production.

The practice of many farmers in confining their pigs to floored pens

and feeding them rations composed chiefly of grains brings about mineral deficiencies, says Smith. In some cases, after two or three months of such feeding the pigs have difficulty in getting up and walking to the feed trough.

He recommends that the pigs be given a mineral mixture of equal parts of ground phosphate, steamed bone meal or defluorinated phosphate, and common salt. This mixture may be left so that the pigs may take it at will. For self-feeding, the mineral mixture is made more tempting by mixing a pound of tankage or meat scrap to nine pounds of the mixture.

Grains may also be supplemented

with a good grade of legume hay at the rate of 5 to 10 percent for fattening hogs, and 10 to 15 percent for sows and boars, Smith says. He points out that sun-cured hay is more effective than artificially cured hay because it contains more vitamin D.

Sun-cured legume hay provides good protein, calcium, phosphorus and other necessary minerals and vitamins.

State College Hints To Homemakers

Don't throw away those chicken feet! There's plenty of good flavor in the bones. Scald the feet a few minutes and then peel off the craly yellow skin. Next, simmer the feet in a saucepan with water to cover for 45 minutes. Strain the broth and use it for added richness in chicken gravy, soup, or with chicken and noodles. The broth can also be substituted for part of the milk in making white sauce for cream-of-leek chicken.

Fat is so precious in these days of rationing that every drop should be used to the best advantage. Hens generally have a large amount of fat. This fat, after being rendered, is delicious when used as a shortening for biscuits, pies, some puddings and bread.

Chicken fat should be used in the same quantity as any other fat. Scrambled eggs can be turned into a hearty low point main dish by adding to them leftover fat, such as chicken, bacon, hamburger or fat from a roast. Tuna or salmon, whether left overs or not, can be added also. Cooked, chopped green peppers, canned tomatoes, and tablespoon of cream or top milk for each egg used, stretches eggs further and gives a smoother "scramble."

There is no need to waste even

pieces of bread. Save all crusts or pieces which are left in the bread box. When the store craves are coming after you, place the bread scraps on a flat surface, such as a pan, and allow them to dry in the slightly heated oven. When crisp, crush the bread with a rolling pin or put in a food chopper. Store the crumbs in a metal or glass jar until needed.
