

Stop Gullies And
Grow Trees

Thousands of acres of land in North Carolina are growing gullies which should be growing trees, reports S. W. Graeber, in charge of Forestry at State College.

Simple methods for the control of gully erosion on small drainage areas from one to ten acres, are described in Extension Circular No. 245 published by State College.

The control measures described in the circular provide only temporary control because final control must in all cases be accomplished by reforestation.

Horse And Mule
Clinics Planned

Fifty nine counties in North Carolina are planning to hold horse and mule clinics this winter to condition work stock for essential work on the farm under war-time conditions.

It's good horse sense to treat horses and mules for worms and bots and have the necessary dental work done, says Case. If you have noticed any loss of weight, unthriftness or digestive troubles in your work stock lately, don't delay having them treated.

Case points out that it costs more to feed a wormy animal and that the wormy animal will do much less work than one free of such parasites and in good health.

He suggests that the animals not be given any feed for at least 12 to 18 hours before treatments are given.

Growers should watch for local announcements as to when and where the clinics are to be held.
