LETTERS FROM CLEVELAND COUNTY
TO THE PEOPLE OF CLEVELAND COUNTY:
 I am county strongly on the men and women of Cleveland County giving me their support in the primary on Saturday, May 27, 1944. I have no campaign manager in this county and no organization. My candidacy is being left entirely in the hands of the people.
 I trust that the friends and work on for all other candidates, both state and local, will aid in looking after my interest and will call the attention of the voters to my candidacy for the United States Senate. Since I am not taking part in these State and local contests, there should be no conflict about this.
 The people of Cleveland County have been so generous to me in the past that I feel that I may depend upon their loyalty and friendship in this contest, and I take this opportunity to urge all of my friends in the county to take time out on Saturday, May 27th, to vote and to get their neighbors to vote. So many of our young men are away in the Armed Service that it will be more important than even for the women to vote.

The women should be tremendously interested in this election for it will mean much in the preservation of world peace and the prevention of future wars. My whole thought now is for an early and victorious termination of this war and then for the stabilizing of our nation and the world, and establishments of an international tribunal to settle controversies between nations and to a void future wars.
 I shall not live long enough to repay the debt of gratitude which I owe to the people of my home county for the wholehearted support which they have always given me. I can only offer to them the assurance that I shall strive to justify their continued confidence by serving the State and nation with complete dedication to the public good and the full extent of my ability in the crucial days which lie ahead.
