DETROIT, May 30. Detroit bakers today were dependent largely on their own ovens for baking as the holiday picnic backlog at a dozen of 1,000 bakeries truck drivers continued to cut off 90 percent of the city's bread supply.

Other relief came from bakers at the Detroit House of Correction who worked far into the night to turn out hundred of loaves of bread to replace the customary hot dog buns at the city's 17 municipal park restaurants.

NEW YORK, May 30. Mayor F. H. La Guardia, four bomb disposal squads and a half dozen police cars sped to Brooklyn when a metal object — believed to be a bomb — fell from an unidentified airplane and impacted itself in a sidewalk.

Police roped off the area and bomb experts went to work gingerly removing the object which was about the size and shape of a duck egg. It turned out to be a piece of machine equipment.


