THE MEANING OF 'D-DAY'

Many folks have been asking the meaning of the symbol "D-Day."
The explanation is that it is nothing more than a military abbreviation. "D" was selected as the code name of the day of invasion because the word "day" begins with the letter "D." It might have been called "X" day, in the same manner, the exact hour of certain military movement or maneuver is designated "H-hour," "M-minute" and so forth. In the last war such a moment was called the zero hour.
"D-Day" is simply an arbitrary symbol to designate the date when the invasion will begin.
As might be pointed out, however, it means a day of decision, a day of defeat for our enemies, a day of dedication for ourselves, a day of destiny for the world.—Morganton News-Herald.

EVEN WAR BONDS ARE MADE OF PULPWOOD

Among the many war uses of pulpwood War Bonds shouldn't be overlooked. While they don't have the direct destructive power of gun powder made of pulpwood, nor the life-saving quality of blood plasma packed in pulpwood containers, they are essential to winning the war.
Buying War Bonds and cutting pulpwood are similar in at least two respects: One, they are primarily responsibilities of civilians on the Home Front and, two, they are necessary to back the men on the fighting front.
Actually farmers and woodmen in this area can do double duty for Uncle Sam and the man overseas this month.
They can cut a few extra cords of pulpwood and put their earnings in War Bonds besides helping speed the day of Victory, this is a good investment.
For a cash outlay of \$16.75 every pulpwood cutter can get a \$25 War Bond. That means a third more for his work.
Let's make this a record month by going over our quota in buying War Bonds and by cutting more pulpwood than any month this year. That will give Hitler and Yoyo a double blow at a time when both of them are tapping.

I felt for loved ones at home for their fighting men, sons, fathers, brothers, husbands, sweethearts. I knew many a prayer was offered that day for the boys over there whose death is all around them. I hurried to the office, where I knew Gene Matthews could tell me of the early developments because he usually turns on his radio before he comes to work. (I never turn mine on). He told me all he had heard, which was plenty. I knew the biggest event in the military history in the world was on, and I knew Kings Mountain news and news was being sent there. I went down the street, radios were turned on everywhere, merchants were beginning to get Old Glory, the symbol of freedom and justice, in front of their stores. Every place I stopped the conversation was invasion. Most seemed contented that the day of anxiety had had arrived. The attitude seemed to be like that of a person who needs a serious operation and the day for the surgeon was at hand, it was something that was dreaded but yet something necessary. It had to be done, and General Eisenhower had said we were ready. D-Day will go down in history as a day of Disaster for Hitler and his gangsters and manhood from The Best Town in The State, had a part in it.
