HEALTH, FATS: Red Stamps as thru 10, good indefinitely. US, US, and US become valid June 4 and remain good indefinitely.

PROCESSED FOODS: Red stamps as through 10, good indefinitely. SUGAR: Sugar Stamps 20 and 21, each good for five pounds indefinitely. Sugar Stamp 22 becomes good for five pounds June 15. Sugar Stamp 24, good for five pounds of candy sugar through February, next year.

RAVING: In 17 East Coast States, A-10 coupons good through August 2.

FUEL OIL: Periods 4 and 5 coupons, good thru Sept. 30.

RECORDS: Algonquin Stamps 1 and 2 good indefinitely.
