## Winter Legumes To Be Planted Early

The farmer who starts getting ready for a crop a month or two before time to plant it, is usually the one who makes the best crop. Early planting is important for all crops but it is almost imperative for Austrian winter peas, vetch, and crimson clover, says E. H. Blair, Extension agronomist at State College. When these crops are planted on time, they do their growing during the part of the year when the land is not needed for anything else. But when planted too late, these winter legumes have to see too much of the warm spring weather when the ground cannot afford to have them taking up the room. Therefore, he has to plow them up before they have time to do the soil any good. The result is that much seed and work have been thrown away.

It takes a thick cover of winter legume vegetation about a foot deep to really do the soil any good. Blair says. The benefit from nitrogen and organic matter is directly proportional to the amount of material present under the soil. The practical minimum is about two or three inches high by April 1st. The same is true for vetch and crimson clover.

If you want a good winter legume crop it is time now to begin looking for your seed, says Blair. It will take 25 pounds per acre for Austrian winter peas, 25 pounds for vetch, and 25 pounds for crimson clover.
