I hope we have an authentic report on Germany's unconditional surrender or something that stands for a cessation of war in that area, on this is in print.

Many of us recall how on Nov. 4, 1918, something before the noon hour, church bells began ringing—the mill whistles began blowing—telephones were put into use and even the news concerning the signing of the Armistice had spread over Kings Mountain. We were prepared for such news and started at first—then there was weeping and gnawing and too strange, to say, since began celebrating in a manner entirely out-of-line. There were no radios to spread the welcome news and no radios to check the spread but we were in for disappointment. When word finally got around that the report was false. We were however better prepared for the real message a week later, Nov. 11.

The exhortation by the Psalmist of old, "O come, let us worship and bow down, let us kneel before the Lord, our Maker," is still good enough for us to follow. For me it's no time for hilarious rejoicing but a time for genuine thanksgiving and most certainly a time to humble ourselves.

**Combat Followed
 Combat Men Gladly**

WITH THE 21ST INFANTRY DIVISION IN GERMANY — Spending alongside of the 21st division, who passed the Third and Fourth Army to the Rhine River and the famed chemical city of Ludwigshafen, the 21st Medical Battalion was open for business 24 hours a day in spite of the 20 to 25 mile a day jumps. In this group is S/pt. Paul W. Connor, 210 City Street, Kings Mountain, N. C.

The 21st Commander, Lieutenant Colonel Matthew A. Gurth, Jr., 210 East Truman Street, Newberry, Michigan, and the clearing station medical doctors and enlisted personnel, were never more than 10 miles from the leading 24th elements, the doughs raced to the Rhine on tanks and trucks.

Adding and evacuating the wounded under German artillery, mortar and rifle fire, was a daily task for the medics during the drive. 21st medical probes through 8-mile and 800-yards fields to doctor men who lost a leg or arm caused by the mine explosions.

During the 24th's initial plunge into the Siegfried Switch line in the Saar-Moselle triangle in January, the 21st handled several hundred battle and non-battle casualties during one 24-hour period without loss of a life. During the busy period, the battalion staff, cooks and clerks helped in carrying stretchers, administering first aid, and assisting the medical officers in surgical operations.
