AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING \$20,000 STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of City Commissioners of the City of Kings Mountain:

Section 1. That the City of Kings Mountain issue its bonds pursuant to The Municipal Finance Act, 1921, as amended, in an amount not exceeding \$20,000 for the purpose of reconstructing the surface of streets in said City.

Section 2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. That a statement of the debt of the City has been filed with the clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its first publication, unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under said Act, and that in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the City at an election as provided in said Act.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 23 day of September, 1946, and was first published on the 26 day of September, 1946.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

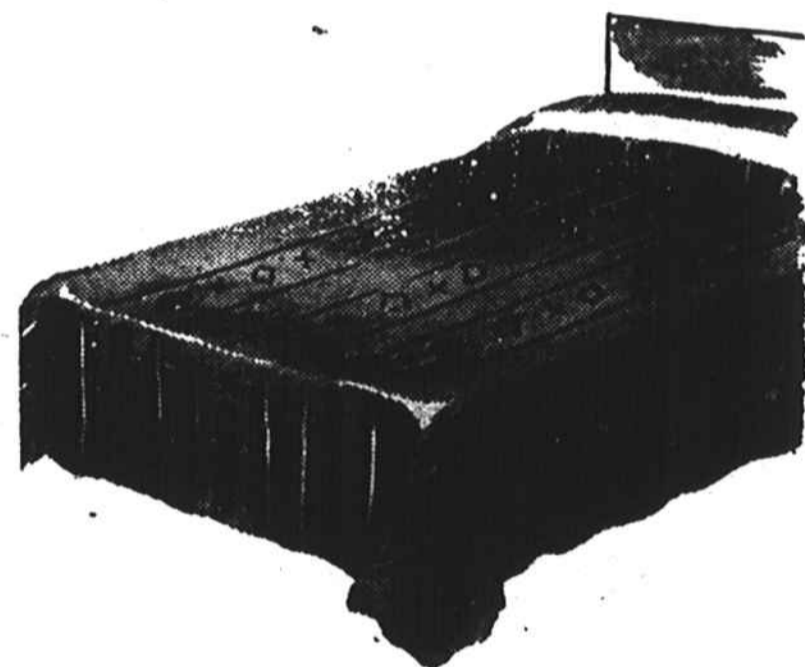
