

Ted Horn To Race On Program Saturday

Charlotte. — In a recent communication to Sam Nunis, director of the AAA sanctioned auto races to be presented at the Southern States Fair on Saturday, Oct. 12, Ted Horn, Indianapolis - famous race driver from Paterson, N. J., disclosed a willingness to race on the fair grounds program.

Nunis is busy rounding up a field of nationally-known speed specialists for the races and the addition of Horn would go a long way in assuring the fair customers of witnessing big time competition. Horn holds the shining distinction of being the most consistent prize

winner in the long history of the Indianapolis 500-mile championships. He finished second in the event to Lou Meyer in 1936, and since then has been third in 1937, fourth in 1938-39-40, third in 1941, and third again this year. The big race was postponed four years due to the late war.

Horn is a daring, cool-headed pilot who burns up the track, whether he's racing at Indianapolis or over a fair grounds dirt oval. Horn took over first in the national points standings released by the AAA recently.

Other great auto race drivers expected to join Horn on the Southern States Fair program are Jole Chitwood, Reading, Pa.; Bill Holland, Bridgeport, Conn.; Johnny Shackelford, Dayton, Ohio.; Tommy Hinner-shitz, Reading, Pa.; Walt Ader, Bernardsville, N. J.; Lee Wallard, Seconectady, N. Y.; and Eddie Zalucki, Detroit, Mich.

There'll be seven big speed events on the fair program, beginning with the qualifying time trials starting at 1 p. m. The first competitive event is listed to start at 2 p. m.

N. C. Breeders Top Poland China Sale

North Carolina Poland China hog breeders sold their animals at an increase of \$14.50 per head over the average price in competition with breeders from Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin, South Carolina, and Georgia at the recent Southeastern Poland China Type Conference and sale at Orangeburg, South Carolina.

P. M. Horton of Wake County sold the top gilt for \$205 and Walter Kirby of Wilson County sold the top boar for \$150. Horton, Kirby, Douglas Hill Farm of Scotland Neck, and R. S. Leonard of Black Mountain marketed their animals at an average price of \$107.50 per head.

The purpose of the conference, according to Swine Specialist Jack Kelley of State College, was for breeders of Poland China hogs, extension workers, and vocational agricultural teachers to meet and agree on the best type of hog to grow.

The official type committee was made up of hog breeders, packers, and one member each from the animal husbandry departments of North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia. About 300 people took part in the conference, which included the judging of nine classes of hogs.

W. P. Farrior, assistant farm agent of Halifax County, came second in the judging contest with a score of 885 out of a possible 900 points.

County Agent J. O. Anthony of Wilson County said that the hogs from North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia "showed up just as well or better than the hogs consigned from outstanding breeders of the Western States."

State College Hints To Farm Homemakers

After selecting the foods which are the best sources of essential nutrients, they must be cared for properly so that their food value will be conserved. Prepare them for the table by the methods which not only will conserve their nutrients, but which at the same time will give the most attractive and palatable product. Losses in food value may be kept at a minimum by observing the following rules:

Foods high in protein, such as meats, eggs, and cheese, should be cooked at a low temperature.

Foods high in fat should never be cooked at temperatures high enough to cause the fat to smoke.

Loss in vitamins is very rapid after the fruit or vegetables have been peeled, and so these foods should be peeled just before eating or cooking.

Both vitamins and minerals are lost if fruits and vegetables are allowed to stand in water after peeling. It is wise to cook vegetables or fruit in the skins often.

Minerals and vitamins are conserved by cooking quickly in just as small an amount of water as possible.

Water in which meat or vegetables are cooked should be saved and used in soups or sauces.

Thrifty gardeners who have space for storage, grow enough vegetables not only to eat and to can, but to lay away for winter use. They will have timed their plantings so that the storable vegetables will be mature at the proper time—not too early and not too late.
