125 Cases TB Found In Cleveland Survey

Final statistics of the Cleveland county tuberculosis survey were released today showing that 125 cases were found, 86 of which were previously unknown. All of these were referred by the U. S. Public Health Service to local physicians.

Of the total number immediate hos pitalization was recommended for 14. Other than TB cases, 92 were found to be suffering from chest diseases, most of which involved malfunctioning of the heart.

County health officials said that the survey technicians, who completed their work Saturday, left 19 x-ray films termed as "suspicious" for examination of private physicians. These were film reakes which indica ted possible tubercular infection.
