Grey Is Baptist Hour Speaker

Atlanta, Mar. 24.—Dr. J. D. Grey opens The Baptist Hour series, "Consider Jesus," Sunday April 3. He is the first man chosen to preach an entire series of thirteen weeks since the program's inauguration in 1941 according to S. F. Lowe, Director of the Radio Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, Atlanta.

In May, Grey begins his 13th year as pastor of the First Baptist church of New Orleans, La. For ten years he has conducted "The Gospel Hour" over WSMB, New Orleans, and now has three regular services broadcast over local stations each Sunday.

A graduate of Union University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Dr. Grey has for ten years been a member of the Home Mission Board; is now President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention; and also president of the Southwide Alumni Association of Southwestern Seminary.
