**Piedmont Camp To Open June 20**

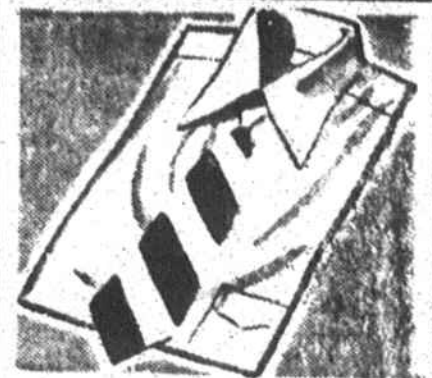
TRYON. — R. H. Brady, Chairman of the Camping Committee of Piedmont Council, Boy Scouts of America, announced this morning that Piedmont Boy Scout Camp at Lake Lanier, near here, will open June 20 and will operate for ten consecutive weeks. An enrollment of more than 2,000 Scouts and leaders from the counties of Alexander, Burke, Caldwell, Catawba, Cleveland, Gaston, Iredell, Lincoln, McDowell, Polk, and Rutherford is anticipated.

R. M. Schiele, Scout Executive of the Piedmont Council, will serve as Director of the Camp and A. C. Warlick, Jr., Assistant Scout Executive, will serve as the Assistant Director. A complete staff of instructors in Nature Study, Life Saving and other water activities, Rifle Marksmanship, Athletics, and the various crafts and skills featured in the Scouting program is being recruited. Scoutmasters of the 120 or more Troops who will attend the camp this summer will also serve as members of the Camp staff during their stay at Camp with their respective Troops.

Piedmont Boy Scout Camp on the shores of Lake Lanier, established twenty five years ago, is recognized as one of the outstanding Boy Scout Training Camps of the Nation and serves the largest number of Boy Scouts among the camps of the Southeast.
