Miss Je'Anne Griffin Became Bride Of Mr. Robert S. Bargar Saturday

Miss Mable Je'Anne Griffin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ellerbe Wilson Griffin of Kings Mountain became the bride of Robert Sellstrom Bargar, son of Mr. and Mrs. Crawford N. Bargar of Jamestown, N. Y., in a simple and beautiful ceremony Saturday evening at eight o'clock in Central Methodist church.

Rev. Joseph Brendall, pastor of the bride, officiated using the double ring ceremony. The vows were exchanged before a background of palms, fern and magnolia. Silvered candelabrum holding lighted cathedral candles and silvered baskets filled with mixed white blooms completed the decorations. Mrs. Aubrey Mauney, organist, of Kings Mountain, Miss Emelyn Gillespie of Salem College, Winston-Salem, and Mr. James Throneburg of Duke University choir and Glee Club, presented the wedding music.

Wedding Music

Prior to the ceremony Mrs. Manny played "Barcarolle" from "June", Andante Cantabile from "Spring Quartet in D Major" and Melodia in E Flat by Tchaikovsky, "Alpho Chi Sweetheart" by Geisler, "Song of Love" arranged by Sigmund Romberg, and "Ave Maria" by Schubert.

Miss Gillespie sang "Through the years" by Youmans, and "How I Love Thee" by Lippe. Mr. Throneburg sang "I Love Thee", by Grieg, "Because" by D'Hardelot, and at the close of the prayer, "O Perfect Love," "O Promise me" by De Koven, and "On the Wings of Song" were played in muto tones during the ceremony. The bridal attendants approached the altar to the strains of "Pomp and Circumstance" by Elgar and the bride to the traditional strains from "Lohengrin" by Wagner. Mendelssohn's march from a "Midsummer Night's Dream" was used for the recessional.

The bridegroom had for his best man Frank Taylor of Jamestown. Ushers were John L. Sellstrom, cousin of the groom, James Tillotson and Bob Robbins, all of Jamestown and Wilson and Walter Griffin, brothers of the bride, and Bill Throneburg of Kings Mountain.

The bride was given in marriage by her father. She wore an heirloom gown of bridal satin in Magnolia White made with full length sleeves and portrait neckline. The fitted bodice was on princess lines and the wide circular skirt fell in a full length train. Tiny satin buttons extended from neck to skirt yoke line in the back. The tiered veil was of old ivory imported point lace over silk illusion and fell from a filagree tiara of pearls. The bride's veil was from her mother's trousseau. She carried a cascade bouquet of lilies of the valley, white orchids and stephanotis.

Bridal Attendants

Miss Marion Arthur of Charlotte and Kings Mountain was maid of honor and Mrs. Frank Thomas Dresser, cousin of the bride, Charlottesville, Va., was matron of honor. The maid and matron of honor wore colonial dresses of Nile green French Marquissette over taffeta made with drop shoulder frills, full gathered skirts over hoops, with pointed waist-lines outlined with deep frills of self-material making a bustle effect and extending to the floor in the back. Their gloves were of white frilled nylon and they wore coronets of white nylon azaleas. Their colonial bouquets were of yellow and copper toned roses on white maline frilled background and tied with yellow satin ribbon. The bridesmaids bouquets were similar in design. They were made of a pastel colored sweet peas surrounded by

belladonna blue delphinium and tied with Nile green ribbon.

Mrs. Griffin, mother of the bride, wore a wisteria crepe dress embroidered in silver with rhinestone and silver accessories and a pink orchid shoulder bouquet. Mrs. Bargar was lovely in an oriental poppy chantilly dress with a shoulder corsage of white orchids.

Moulded bridal ices shaped into wedding bells, slippers, lilies and lovebirds were served with individual wedding cakes decorated in green. Punch was served by Mesdames Carl Mayes, Haywood Lynch, Charles Carpenter, Jr., and Mrs. O. P. Lewis. The long exquisitely arranged table covered with white linen was centered with silvered candelabrum filled with burning tapers placed between lovely arrangements of white stock, tulips, and sweetpeas. Silver trays of bridal cakes, compotes filled with nuts and two crystal punch bowls completed the table appointments.

For going away the bride wore a suit of sheer wool in desert sand with matching straw hat. Her bag, gloves, and shoes were of brown lizard and she wore a white orchid.

Mrs. Bargar is the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ellerbe W. Griffin and the granddaughter of R. Walter Kurfees and the late Luzene Maxwell Kurfees of Davie County, N. C. She was educated at Virginia Intermont College, Bristol, Va., the University of N. C., and received her degree from Syracuse University.
