Animal Show Here On Friday, Saturday

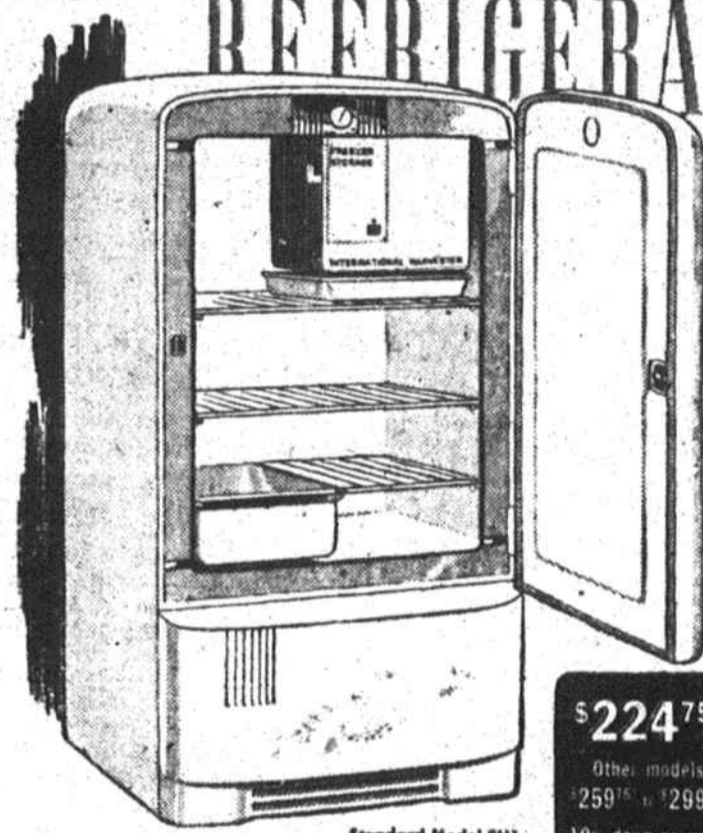

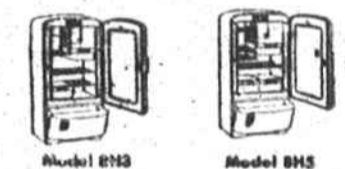
