

Local NCEA Leaders Attend Conference

Miss Lois Watson, president of the Kings Mountain unit of the North Carolina Education association, and Mrs. Helen G. Neal, president of the Gaston county unit, attended the NCEA's annual conference for local leaders held in Salisbury at Catawba college last weekend.

Some 225 teachers, representing

172 NCEA units and 20,000 North Carolina teachers, attended the three-day session, and heard panel discussions and addresses by educational leaders. Among the major addresses given at the conference were those by Dr. Lyle W. Ashby, assistant executive secretary of the National Education association, and by Lew Parmenter, executive manager of the National School Service Institute, of Chicago.

Some 120 boys from the sixth, seventh and eighth grades underwent physical examinations at the high school gymnasium Tuesday afternoon in preparation for the Mountaineer Club sponsored Grammar Grade Athletic Program for the youngsters.

Three Kings Mountain physicians—Drs. Paul E. Hendricks, W. L. Ramseur and Philip G. Padgett—conducted the examinations and pronounced 119 players as physically fit to participate in the program.

The number of players examined by schools included—West 26, East 30, Central 41 and Park-Grace 22.
