New Counties Added For Crop Insurance

Beaufort, Caswell, Duplin, Forsyth and Jones counties have been selected for tobacco crop insurance in 1950, according to Julian E. Mann, State director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. These counties were selected on the basis of signed requests by interested tobacco producers in those counties from a total of eight counties actively seeking the insurance for next year.

Rutherford county has been selected as a new cotton county in 1950.

In 1949 there were ten counties with all-risk crop insurance in North Carolina, and these are being continued in 1950. They are Columbus, Pitt, Stokes, Surry, Vance, Wake and Wilson counties with tobacco insurance; Cleveland and Mecklenburg with cotton insurance; and Perquimans with "multiple" crop insurance.

The Eighty-First Congress permitted a fifty percent increase in the number of counties over those with insurance in 1949 on a nation-wide basis. The Act also permits insurance on tobacco while in the curing barns and packhouses, covering fire and other unavoidable causes beginning with 1950 policies. Duplin county led the five counties selected in the number of tobacco producers agreeing to participate in 1950, and Beaufort producers showed the largest percentage of those eligible for insurance agreeing to participate next year.

About 40 percent of the 15,000,000 eligible World War II veterans have had some sort of GI Bill training since the law went into effect in June 1944, a recent survey of Veterans Administration records disclosed.

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
