Footo Stockholders OK Debt Increase
PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — At a special stockholders meeting today, Footo Mineral Company shareholders approved the proposed increase in the company's indebtedness now totaling \$4,500,000. Footo management is able to consummate plans for financing the previously announced lithium expansion program.
Footo is continuing its basic planning at Sunbright, Virginia, with ground breaking for the first building scheduled for August 7, 1952.
At Kings Mountain, North Carolina, plans are nearing completion for the additional equipment, which when installed, will substantially increase the output of lithium ore and associated minerals.
