The fireplace is away from traffic, but placed to include the furnace flue. The front of the living room can be used for dining



Allowable Rate Of GI Loan Interest Hiked

In announcing an increase from per cent to 41/2 per cent in the maximum allowable interest on GI loans guaranteed by the Veterans Administration after May 5, 1953, Administrator of Veterans Affairs Carl R. Gray, Jr. said it is the opinion of VA that the increased rate will attract lenders to the loan program.

This should result, he continued, in making housing more readily available to World War II and Korean veterans under the liber al terms of the GI Bill.

Zoning Change **Hearing Thursday**


The city is advertising today a hearing on a requested zoning change for its regular board of commissioners meeting on June

Property owners adjacent are invited to attend the nearing. Joe Hendrick, city clerk, sald that Mr. Ward had indicated a desire to erect a warehouse.
