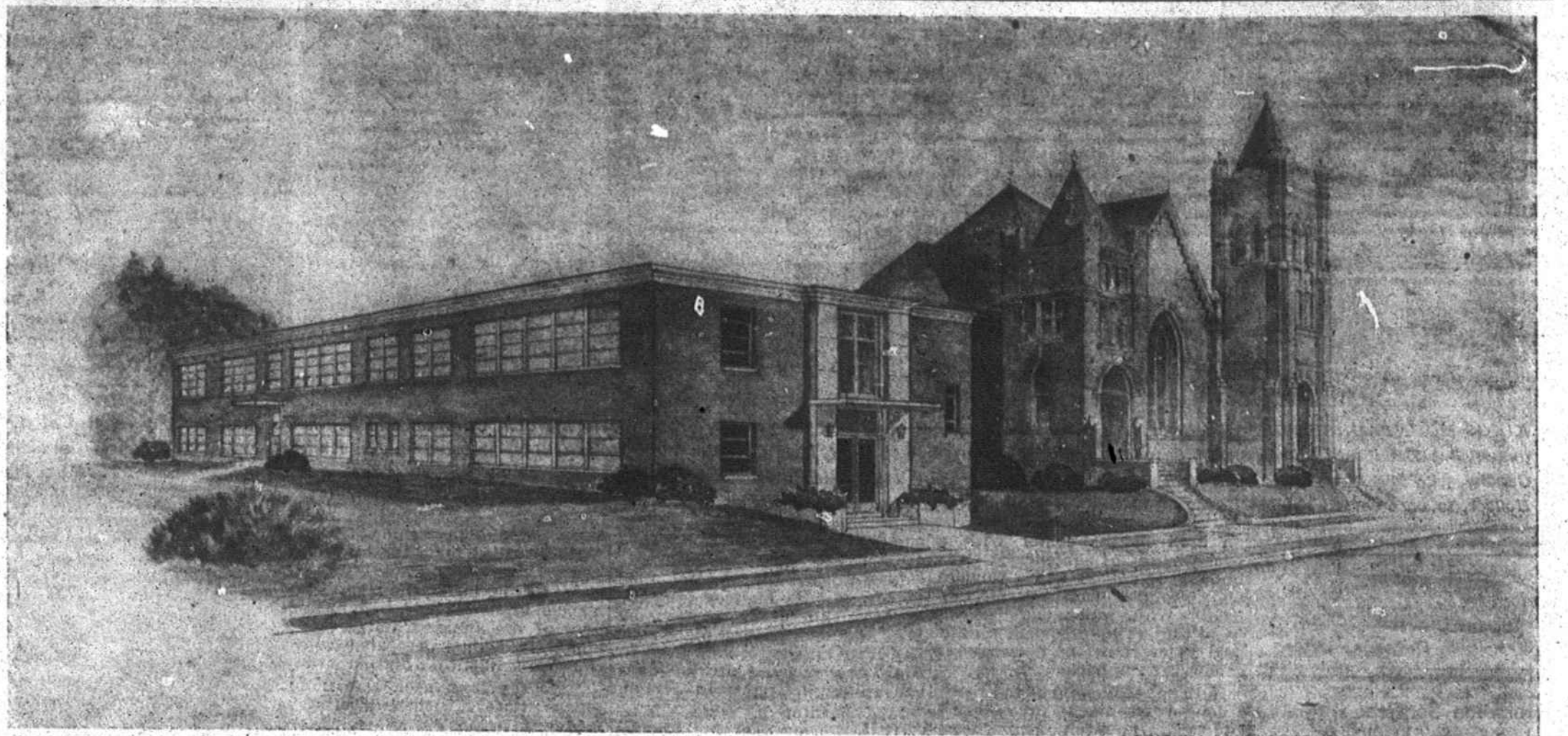

PLANNED CENTRAL METHODIST CHURCH ADDITION—Pictured above is the architect's drawing of an addition to the Central Methodist church school formally approved by the congregation during services Sunday morning. The planned addition, which faces on South Piedmont avenue, was designed by James L. Beam, Jr., Cherryville architect and was submitted to the church for study on May 24. The addition would provide an additional 8,660 square feet of floor space on two floors and would provide for the rearrangement of the 3,120 square feet of existing space. The cost of the planned addition and alterations has been estimated at \$77,000 by Mr. Beam. The church is to launch a financial campaign immediately, with building to begin as soon as possible after the goal is in sight. Plans for the addition were submitted to the church by the program and planning committee of the Board of Stewards: E. W. Griffin, Jr., chairman, Kelly Dixon, Baxter Poyseur, Mrs. C. A. Butterworth, Mrs. J. H. Patterson, B. S. Peeler, Manley Fuller and Paul Walker.
