

Collins Waived Intent-To-Kill Charges Monday

Bill Collins, 23-year-old Kings Mountain man, waived preliminary hearing before Judge Jack H. White in Kings Mountain Recorder's court Monday on a charge of assault with intent to kill.

The charges were warranted by H. L. Harris, Aiken, S. C., resident and weapon used was allegedly an army rifle. The alleged attempt occurred Saturday night.

Case is to be heard at the next session of Superior Court in Shelby. Bond was set at \$500.

Nolle prosequere was taken in the case of Veo Wingo, Negro, who was charged with "peeping tom" on June 10. Charges were warranted by Mrs. Eva Cash, Ridge street Negro resident, who testified that she had repeatedly told the defendant to "stay away from her home." He should have been charged with "trespassing," court ruled.

Oliver D. Moore, charged with illegal possession of non-taxed paid whiskey for beverage purposes, was given sentence of 60 days, suspended upon payment of a \$5 fine and costs of court. He was found guilty on an additional count of public drunkenness.

Junior Carroll, Negro, charged with assault on Lena Carroll, Negro, was given sentence of 60-days, suspended upon payment of a \$20 fine and costs of court. The assault grew out of an argument between the two, prosecuting witness testified, over a "powder puff" Sunday night.

Case against John Dawkins, Negro, charged with driving while under the influence of intoxicants and resisting arrest, was transferred to Shelby for trial by jury upon deposit of a \$80 jury fee.

Case against Tom Patterson, who was charged with speeding and reckless driving, and George Short, charged on a count of disorderly conduct, were continued until court session of June 22. Two cases of public drunkenness were continued, and capias were issued for other defendants who had failed to appear for trial.

Capias was issued for Jack Dempsey Castin, Asheville resident, who was charged with speeding and three cases of public drunkenness were disposed of in the Monday session.
