Vacation-Driving Safe Habit Urged

RALEIGH, August 27 — "I need another two weeks to rest up." If you have uttered this time-honored complaint after past vacations, it is possible that your vacation-driving habits need a change, too," according to J. T. Outlaw, Executive Vice President of North Carolina Motor Carriers Association.

Making the statement at a time of "last minute" quick vacations, in connection with his industry's current campaign for safer vacation driving, the representative of North Carolina's trucking industry decried the growing tendency of the American public to try to cover entirely too much ground in too short a time, particularly a two-week vacation. He pointed out that this vacation-driving pressure is an underlying cause

of many of the accidents which are officially attributed to excessive speed for the conditions existing.

"Fatigue is also a factor," he stated, explaining that the average man drives his car only a few

hours a day and at relatively low speeds for 50 weeks a year. "He often has no conception of the difference between his normal driving and the pace he's trying to keep during his vacation."

"The professional truck driver

knows better than to knock himself out fighting traffic and racing to make up fancied lost time. The gains are slight and the risk of an accident is tremendous."

Outlaw noted that truck drivers know from long experience that

extreme speed and other forms of reckless driving make little, if any difference in travel time.
