Trio Attended Marion Meeting

Mayor G. A. Bridges, Commissioner Gurney Grantham, and Bob Osborne, chairman of the Industrial Diversification committee, attended the second development forum of the State Department of Conservation and Development at Marion Tuesday evening.

The forum, which is the second of a series of meetings held by the State C & D department under the direction of Ben E. Douglas, featured several prominent industrialists as speakers. Norman H. Collison, vice-president of Ecusta Paper Corporation of Plisagh Forest, spoke on "What Industrialists are Seeking". In discussion of the desirability of a plant site, Mr. Collison said industrialists seeking plant locations consider the following factors:

1. Power (cheap, if possible, but mainly free from interruption).
2. Central geographic location.
3. Distribution facilities (mainly railroad, truck routes).
4. Adequate water supply.
5. Waste disposal.
6. Taxes reasonable (but only to be considered relatively compared to value received from payment of taxes).
7. Friendly citizens in the town (do they want industry?).
8. Quality, character and dependability of local labor.
9. Vocational training available locally in schools.

Edwin Gill, state treasurer, remarked, "To bring new industry into our State is not only desirable — it is a necessity if North Carolina is to share in the growth

Yesterday morning about 6:30 local firemen answered a call to Kings Mountain Bonded warehouse on W. King street. The fire which began in the building's lower floor, damaged around twenty bales of cotton.
