Apple Slogan Being Changed by Farmers

North Carolina apple growers would change the old slogan, "An apple a day keeps the doctor away." It no longer seems apropos. They'd like to hear folks start saying, "An apple three times a day keeps toothache away."

Carl E. Vandeman, assistant Wilkes County farm agent for the N. C. State College Agricultural Extension Service, says, "Competing foods have gone a long way through the use of often repeated health claims in uprooting the place apples once held in the minds of the average consumer."

"Why not change the slogan?" asks Vandeman. "Matter of fact, the apple is nature's own toothbrush. No other food has its combination of crisp, crunchy texture and bright, mouth watering, stimulating flavor which enables it to perform this dental health service."

Apples have for decades sold themselves on their own appearance and good qualities, says Vandeman, and growers in some states and regions have had to do a good bit of advertising and promotional work. Not until recently, however, has a definite national apple promotion program been organized and planned. Such a program will have a great benefit right here in North Carolina in the Brushy Mountains and Blue Ridge sections. "Ours is one of the few states in the Union in which apple production is on the increase. Growers from many sections of the nation look at us with envy because here we can start picking the juicy Red Delicious apples even by the last of August or the first week in September."

Negro Bound Over On Belk Robbery Charge Monday During Busy Session

Probable cause was found against Samuel Luther Roseboro, 21-year-old Kings Mountain Negro on charges of breaking and entering Belk's Department Store Friday night, in Kings Mountain recorder's court here Monday.

The case was bound over to Superior Court and Roseboro, a four-day parolee from New Jersey State Penitentiary, was placed in the custody of state prison authorities.

The Negro man entered the store through a trap door on the second floor, Hilton L. Ruth, Belk's department store manager, Bill Ruth, and Jack Reynolds, store clerks, told the court. He slept in the building all night and awakened about the time the store was opened Saturday morning.

Merchandise, that Roseboro was allegedly attempting to take from the building, was valued at \$81.

He was a former Belk's employee several years ago and was serving a five-year sentence on automobile theft charges when he was paroled last week.

Another defendant, Lawrence Motz, 30-year-old Kings Mountain man, was sentenced to serve six months on the roads after being found guilty of passing three worthless checks to Mrs. Clarence Dixon, W. M. Gantt, and T. J. Ellison. Each of the checks was for \$10.

The defendant pled guilty to the charges.

Other cases heard and disposed of in the court session included:

Non-suit was taken by the state in a case charging Claude W. Huffstetler with reckless driving. John J. Mahoney, of Shelby, was defense counsel.

Roy Hopper, charged with assault on female, was given a 90 day road term, suspended on good behavior conditions, payment of a \$15 fine and costs of court.

C. W. Sisk, Shelby resident, was found guilty of reckless driving and given a 60-day road sentence, suspended on conditions that he pay hospital and medical bills for C. D. Fortune, Highway Patrolman, who suffered a fractured arm in the arrest. He was also taxed with court costs.

Leonard Lee Irving, of Crumpton, charged with running a red light, was given a 30-day road sentence, suspended on payment of costs of court.

Robert Rhinehardt, charged with passing a worthless check, was sentenced to serve 90-days

His driver's license was received by Court Clerk C. E. Carpenter to be revoked by law for a one-year period.

J. Hugh McClain, Negro, charged with disposing of mortgaged property, was sentenced to serve a 6-months road term, suspended on good behavior conditions, and payment of court costs.

Bonds were forfeited in cases charging George H. Conley with speeding and one other defendant with public drunkenness.

Richard Welch, Jr., charged with reckless driving, was sentenced to serve 60 days on the roads, sentence suspended on good behavior conditions, payment of a \$5 fine and court costs.

Cases against Willie Duncan, Jr., and Jack R. Gordon, both

charged on speeding counts, were continued.

Caplases were issued for Sheriff R. Clark, charged with driving while under the influence of intoxicants, and Bobby Lee and Gen. va Green, of Blacksburg, S. C., who were charged with disturbing the peace.

One defendant was sentenced to serve a 30 day and eight public drunkenness. Given suspended sentences. Two public drunkenness cases were continued.

Omar Smith, Negro, charged with running a red light, was given a 30 day sentence, suspended on payment of court costs.

Nolle Proesse was taken in a case charging Clyde Stinnett with non-support. Prosecutress paid court costs.

Case against Robert Tate, who was charged with abandonment and non-support, was continued. One defendant appeared before Judge Jack White Monday on a charge of illegal possession of non-tax-paid whiskey for beverage purposes.

City Police Officers W. G. Ellison and P. A. Hawkins told the court that Kenneth C. Kilbrow, New York native now living in Gastonia, was arrested Sunday night with six cans of beer, seal unbroken, in his car.

Kilbrow was found not guilty after sufficient evidence had not been given to prove that more than a lawful amount of beer was in his possession.

Kilbrow, after sentence had been pronounced, took the box with the beer and walked from the courtroom.

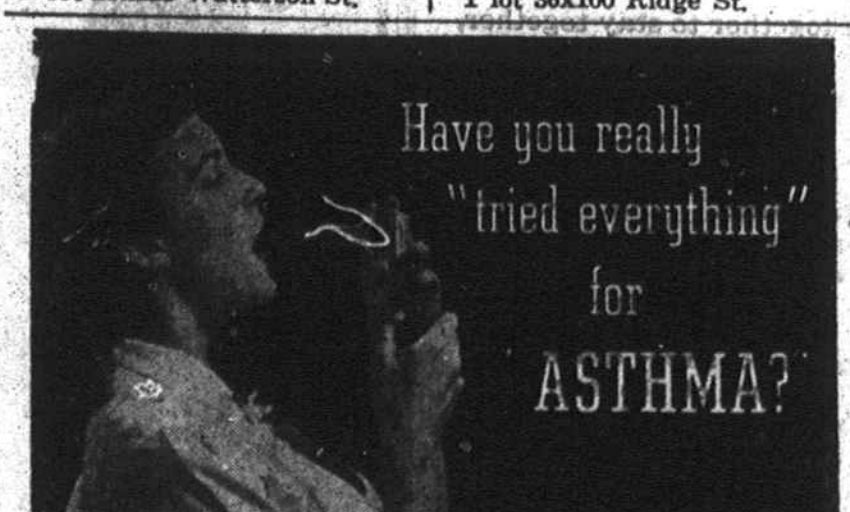
