Sigurd Rascher, Davidson Concert Band To Present 3 Joint Recitals

Sigurd Rascher, the greatest virtuoso the saxophone has ever known, and the Davidson College Concert Band will present three joint recitals in this area this coming Thursday and Friday, December 3 and 4.

Rascher and the Davidson band will appear Thursday at 2:00 p. m. at the Mooresville High School and at 8:00 p. m. at Appalachian State Teachers College in Boone, and then present their final recital at 8:15 p. m. in Chambers Auditorium on the Davidson College campus.

Kenneth R. Moore, assistant professor of music at Davidson, announced today that the program would include Mendelssohn's "Overture for Band," "Death and Transfiguration," Maurice Whitney's "Introduction and Samba," Sousa's "King Cotton March," "Fuge in F minor" by Gould-Allred, and Glazunov's "Concerto for Saxophone."

Rascher has received critical acclaim all over the world in more than two decades of classical concerts.

Much of his time is spent in traveling all over the United States and Canada to play for school bands and to demonstrate the possibilities of the saxophone to band masters and college music faculties. To him public performance is not an act of self-display. His work is completely

governed by two responsibilities. The first he feels towards his instrument which he has raised, more than anyone else, to the equal of any of the aristocrats of the concert stage, and the second is an effort to combine his idea of what the saxophone should be with his feeling for people.

There will be a small admission charge for the Davidson College performance. Tickets will be on sale before the concert Friday night in the Lobby of Chambers Building.
