Regular January meeting of the ADWC was held at the Linwood club house Friday evening.

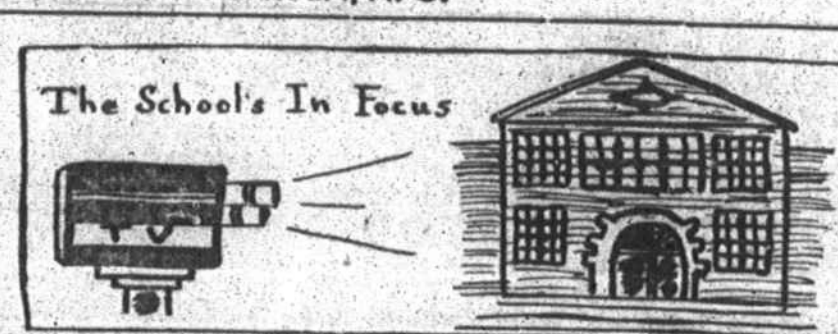

Progress is being made in the field of guidance in the high school. When students become juniors and seniors, they receive aid in choosing a vocation that they are best suited for. The present senior class was given a series of tests when they were juniors to help determine many things that they needed to know about their personalities and vocational preferences. The tests consisted of a mental ability test, preference record test for vocational purposes, and an adjustment inventory test to see how well the student is adjusted at home, in health, and in social and emotional situations. The results of these tests are very helpful to the students themselves, the teachers, and to potential future employers.

A representative of the State Employment Commission each year gives seniors an aptitude test to enable each individual to see what field of work he is best suited for. Part of this test is a finger dexterity test while other parts of the test bring out likes and dislikes, certain abilities and skills.

As more progress is made in education, guidance will become an important part of the high school curriculum. Many schools have already employed a regular guidance counselor. Perhaps the near future will bring such an addition to the faculty of our own school.
