Prayer meeting at the Shiloh Presbyterian church shall conclude the study of Genesis, Wednesday evening — Chapters 49 and 50.





The Kings Mountain Chapter of the National Honor Society presented its initial program of the year on Friday, January 16, in the High School auditorium.

Mr. L. E. Abbott, Vice-President and Cashier of the First National Bank was guest speaker for the occasion.

President Sherrill Spears presided. Since the program was designed to familiarize the student body with the purpose and principles of the Society, he gave a brief history, mentioning the facts that the Kings Mountain chapter has been in existence since 1937 and that induction into the Society is recognized throughout the nation as the highest honor any school can bestow upon a high school student.

Norma Lee Sipes introduced Mr. Abbott, who spoke to the student body on the part character plays in every individual's life. "Character," said Mr. Abbott, "is not inherited; neither is it obtained as a gift."
