Laura Morris bucketed 24 field goals and hit three foul shots for 51 points to pace Coach Jeff Wells' sextet. Jeanelle Anthony had 14 points and Hazel Bollin 9 in the high-scoring contest, which was deadlocked at 40-all at the half.

A strong third quarter surge did the trick for the winners. Guard Wilma Ledbetter was outstanding on defense for the Bethware six.

Coach Wells' boys team jumped off fast in the nightcap, scoring 17 points in the first period to take a 10-point lead and matching Mooresboro's 10 points in the second quarter to stay on top at the half.

After a low-scoring third can (won 3-6 by the losers) Bethware effectively contained a determined Mooresboro bid in the final chapter to take the victory.

## BASKETBALL

After posting a win over the Jr. Optimist at Cramerton, the "Bantams" lost a practice game Saturday morning with Coach Jeff Wells' 9th graders at the Bethware gym.

Games will be limited for this group to inter-city contests."

A league with Carlton of Cherryville and Osgood of Bessemer City sponsoring a team each to round out a four-team league is contemplated. This type baseball works on the same rules and principles as Little League baseball with national headquarters being located at Washington, Pa. J. Howard Ware is president and the name, "Pony," stands for "Protect Our Nation's Youth."

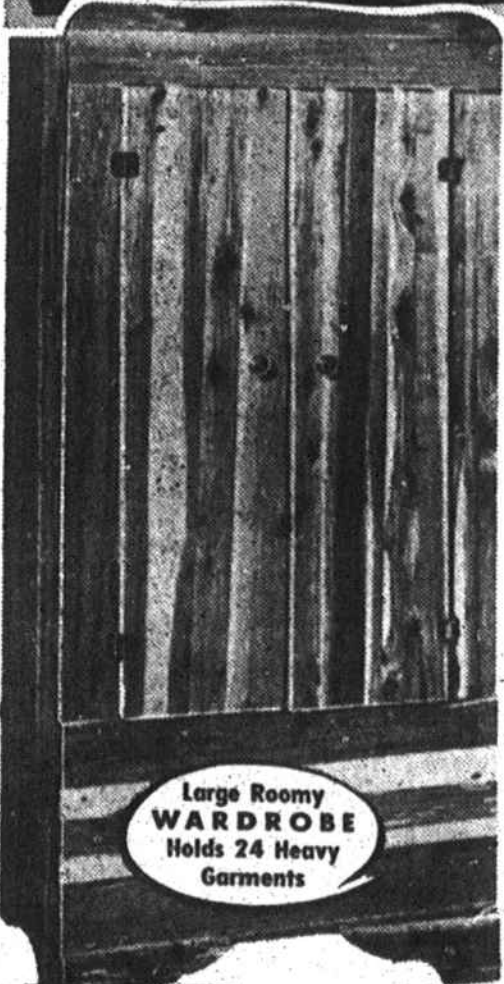
