and SOCIAL SECURITY

Self employed individuals covered by social security are required to file an annual report of net earnings from their trade or business on or before March 15th. Joseph P. Walsh, manager of the Gastonia social security office, pointed out today that every self employed person engaged in a trade or business covered under social security with net profits of \$400, or more in 1953 is obliged to file a return. This report covering net earnings for the year of 1953 is filed along with income tax returns. Walsh stated these self employment tax returns form the basis for future benefits under Old Age & Survivors Insurance. In order to be assured of full credit toward the protection afforded by Old Age & Survivors Insurance, Walsh emphasized that each self employed person should make certain his return is complete and accurate. The reporting form, Schedule C, must show the individual's social security number. Omission of the number or listing an incorrect number may prevent the posting of earnings to an individual's account. All business expenses must be itemized as social security credits are based on net earnings after business deductions are made. If these expenses are not shown on the report the Social Security Administration must contact the taxpayer before crediting his account. In previous years the self employed taxpayer has not always adequately described the nature of his business activity. This has resulted in field investigations to determine whether such income was properly taxable under social security. A business should be correctly described with simple terms such as: restaurant, grocery, beauty shop, hardware store, etc.

Walsh suggests that puzzled taxpayers in the self employed category contact the Gastonia office for information toward filing a complete and accurate report. The Gastonia office is located at 212 W. Second Ave. The phone number is 5-4611. A representative of the Gastonia office is at the City Hall in Kings Mountain on the first and third Mondays of each month at 9:30 a. m.

Chest Measurement Equals Cows Weight

Now you can weigh your cow by measuring her girth. Howard Clapp, Cleveland County farm agent for the State College Extension Service, says the technique, used long ago by Danish dairymen and reflected in the country in the girthing chains of a generation or so ago, has been brought up to date through a study of weights and body measurements of some 1,700 American dairy cows.

It has been found, says Mr. Clapp, that the measurement of a cow's heart girth — around the forechest directly back of the front legs — is a fairly accurate indication of the animal's total weight. And it holds true for animals of all ages.

Tape measures based on the recent findings and giving a direct reading of the weights as related to the measurements have been distributed to many farmers by their feed dealers. This modern version of grandfather's girthing chain comes in handy in buying, selling, classifying, judging, and feeding dairy cattle when scales are not available, he concluded.

State College's **HINTS TO HOMEMAKERS**

PRACTICE RELAXING — Twisting your handkerchief, a lock of hair or other personal articles indicates self-consciousness, nervousness. This self-conscious habit can be overcome without too much trouble if one will exercise a little will power. Practice constantly letting the hands lie relaxed. One must develop a feeling of muscular control and poise. It makes other people around you have the "hebe jebies" to see someone twisting, pulling, or fidgeting with some article of clothing, fussing with hair, face, or clothing accessories. These are indications of emotional insecurity.

Make the habit of letting the hands lie relaxed in your lap, or the arm of a chair or desk, or wherever you sit down.

ORANGES — BUYING DO'S FOR BEST VALUES — Choose fine fruit, heavy for its size. Skin should be smooth, waxy, and thin. There are different kinds of oranges — juice oranges, Valencia and Navel. The Navel orange is perfect for sectioning, slicing, and eating out of the hand (perhaps a bit higher in price). They are seedless. Valencias are excellent for juice and sectioning. Juice oranges often come in bags. Sometimes color has been sprayed on their bright skin. The coloring does not change the flavor or eating quality. The coloring is a harmless vegetable coloring that makes the fruit colorful and bright. In an eight, eight-oz. uyi oranges (10 to 14 oranges) you could expect to get about eight, eight-oz. glasses of juice. In a five pound bag of oranges, (six to nine large oranges) you would get about five glasses. Be a good consumer buyer.

SOUPS — Have you ever used some of the good creamed soups for pour-on sauces, creamed dishes, or as a base for casserole dishes? They're wonderful! Those left over vegetables and meats you would rather not look at again can be made not only tempting to look at, but also so very good! Try cream of tomato, asparagus, mushroom and celery soups; and there are many others.
