clauses, Mayor Bridges added. Prior to launching the discusion on the \$600,000 expenditures plan, Mayor Bridges outlined plans for issuance of \$515,000 in revenue bonds for a natural gas distribution system, in event a tentative allocation of gas by the Federal Power Commission becomes permanent. He said the onds would not pledge the full faith and credit of the city and would be paid for by the users of natural gas. He also expressed
