### February Arrest Totals Released

The police department averaged three arrests daily here in February, Chief Hugh A. Logan reported this week. The total number of arrests was 94, 11 less than in January.

There were 26 arrests for public drunkenness which, as usual, topped the list.

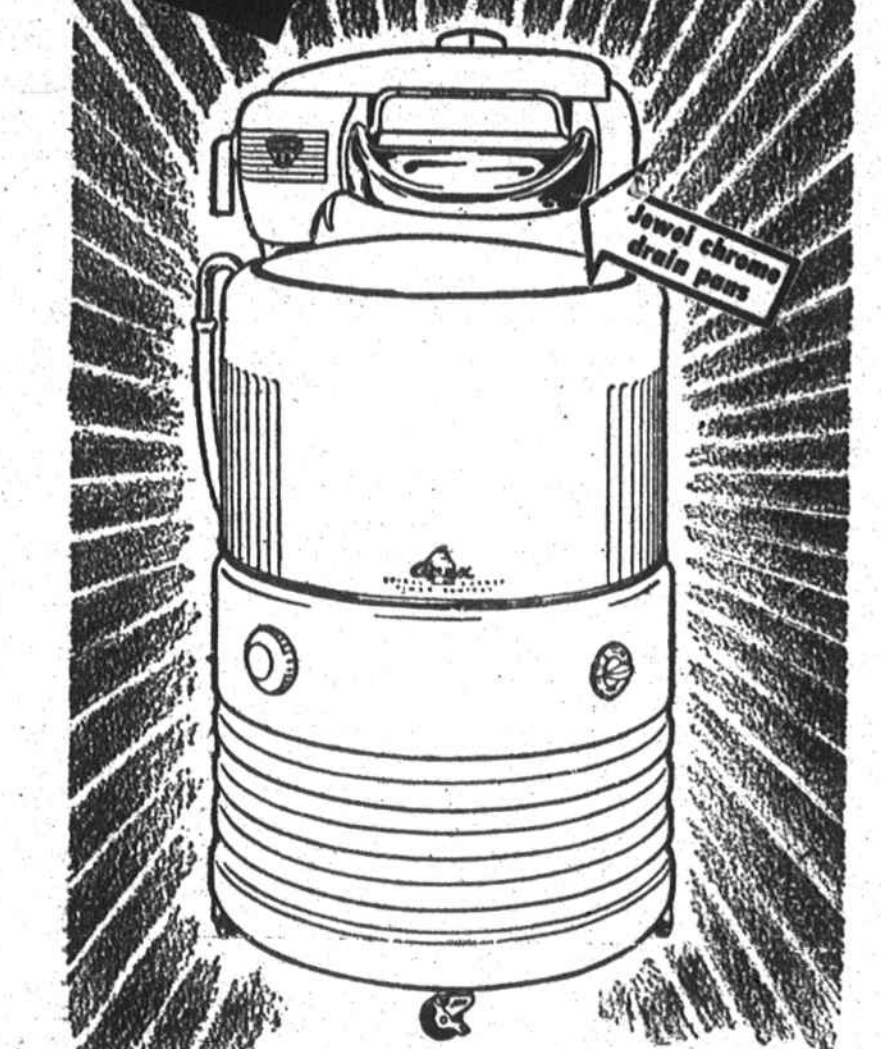
