#### Hints To Homemakers

Precautions For Home Safety— Keep sewing box covered and where it cannot be reached by the children. When they need a cutting instrument, give them only blunt-tipped shears.

In selecting toys, choose those that are sturdy enough to withstand vigorous use and, for small children, select only toys that are too large to be put into mouths. Compare the safety features of the first set with the unsafe aspects of others.

Keep all electric outlets covered when not in use. Otherwise, children may poke at the outlet with a small metal object and receive a severe shock.

Home Safety For The Not-So-Young - About half of the home accident fatalities occur among persons 65 years of age and older. It is essentfal that in every room of the house the furniture be so arranged that easy and safe passage is assured. Floors should never be highly waxed and rug pads or slipproof powder should be used with scatter rugs. This is true for all homes Mr. and Mrs. R. D.
