**Poston-Tate Vows Exchanged Saturday  
In Formal Ceremony At Shelby Church**

Dr. Zeno Wall, minister of the church, officiated, using the double-ring ritual, and peaked candelabra holding white lighted tapers interspersed with a sunburst of white gladioli, palms, and greenery, provided altar decoration.

Mrs. Kemp Huss of Lincolnton, organist, and Mrs. Ernest Beam of Shelby, soloist, presented a program of wedding music. Organ program before the ceremony included, "Moonlight Sonata," "To A Wild Rose," and "O Perfect Love". As vows were exchanged, the organist played, "Claire de Lune" by deBussy.

Vocal selections included, "Indian Love Call," and "Because", and as a benediction after vows had been said, "The Lord's Prayer" by Malotte.

Given in marriage by her brother, Curtis McBride Poston, the bride wore a white wedding gown of Rose chantilly lace over bridal satin. The sweetheart neckline of the gown was banded with self-applique, and the long lace sleeves were caught tight at the wrists with buttons and extended to form calla points at the hands.
