Youths Reminded Of Draft Act

The Cleveland County selective service office is reminding young men passing their eighteenth birthday and young ex-service men who have never registered under selective service that federal law requires their registration with the board.

The Selective Service Act requires male youths born after August 30, 1922, to register within five days after they become 18 years of age.

The Act also applies to men in the age group discharged from service but never registered. These men have 30 days from date of discharge to register with the board.

Penalties are provided for failure to register. Mrs. Clara Newman, clerk to the board said.

The board has been ordered to furnish 40 men for induction on August 24. Mrs. Newman said about half the July induction quota from Cleveland County included volunteers and added there would be some volunteers among the August group. She doubted, however, there would be sufficient volunteers to fill the full call.
