## **Police Report Two Mishaps**

A four car collision was reported by Kings Mountain Police department to have occurred Friday morning around 9 o'clock at the intersection of U.S. 29 and U.S. 74 on King street.

Involved in the accident were a 1954 Ford traveling south on U. S. 29, and driven by Lillian T. Battle, Negress; a 1950 Ford traveling north on U. S. 29 and driven by Raymond Browning Wright, of route 2; a parked 1954 Ford owned by W. S. Cashion, of 111 Lackey street, and a parked Chevrolet pick-up truck owned by Otis Falls, of Ridge street

- The accident occurred, accord. ing to the police report, when the Battle vehicle, while attemp: ting to make a left turn, went out of control and struck the Wright vehicle which was awaiting the change of the traffic signal. The report stated the Battle car glanced off the Wright car struck the parked Cashion car causing the Cashion car to strike the Falls car knocking it against a building. Damages to the four vehicles were estimated to total \$812.36. The accident was investigated by Sgt. Martin Ware and Officer Jack Stone.

Police also reported a minor accident involving cars driven by Ray Junior Leach, of route 1, Grover, and a car driven by Ray P. Willard, of Trenton, N. J. The accident occurred Thursday, police stated, around 4:45 p. m. on Railroad avenue, when the brakes of the Leach vehicle failed to hold and causing the vehicle to roll backwards into the Willard car. Damages resulting from the accident, which was investi gated by Officers B. P. Cook and W. G. Ellison, were estimated to total approximately \$10.
