



### **Postal Service** Will Be Pared

Saturday postal service will be severely restricted here and throughout the nation beginning May 9, Postmaster Charles Alexander has announced.

Local changes will include: 1) Parcel post delivery within the city limits will be cut from six days to five days. The non-delivery day will be Wednesday, since the business houses are closed on Wednesday afternoons.

2) Parcels will continue to be delivered on all rural routes and mounted routes as usual with no curtailment in delivery.

3) Effective Saturday, May 9, and continuing every Saturday thereafter, the local postoffice will open one consolidated stamp and parcel window. All other windows will be closed.

4) Effective May 9 there will be no money orders sold at the postoffice on Saturdays. It will e necessary for patrons to purchase their money orders during the week days. Rural carriers will not accept money order aplications on Saturday.

5) Box rent will not be accepted on Saturdays.

6) Postage meters will not be serviced on Saturdays. Kings Mountain post office's

#### **Kings Mountain** C of C Urges **Patron Support**

Southern Bell Telephone Company will poil Kings Mountain area subscribers within the next few weeks to determine whether they wish toll free service to Gastonia.

Kings Mountain Chamber of Commerce is urging support of the expanded toll free service which would more than double the present numbers Kings Mountain area subscribers can dial toll free.

Additional cost would be a maximum of 60 cents per month for residential subscribers, and \$1.50 per month for business subscribers.

Kings Mountain subscribers now have toll free service to approximately 13,000 numbers. With the expanded toll free service they would be able to dial as local calls approximately 30,000 numbers. Should the subscriber poll fa-

vor the expanded toll free service, it would probably be next year before the service could be provided, due to necessity for Southern Bell to install additional equipment and cable. Bryan Houck, Bell Gastonia group man-

ager, said yesterday. Jack H. White, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce telephone rate committee, said Wednesday:

"There will be a very nominal increase in the monthly charge of soe for one and two party nonbusiness lines and a monthly in-crease of \$1.50 for business lines. When you consider that one tele-phone call to Gastonia is 40c plus 10% excise tax for a person to person call for 3 minutes, one can readily see that this is a very nominal charge for vastly increased service.
