Full Discount Is Available **Only In August**

Both the Cleveland County and City of Kings Mountain tax colectors are now accepting 1964 tax pre-payments, in order that citizens may qualify for the full two percent discount allowed on August pre-payments.

Tax pre-payments are being accepted, even though neither agency has completed the annual chore of preparing tax bills. due to the delay in receiving new appraisal figures in effect for 1964.

Robert S. Gidney, county col-lector, said Wednesday that all Number 4 Township tax bills for individuals have been prepared and that he anticipated corporate accounts would be completed by the weekend.

Meantime, he said he hopes to follow the same policy as previously, to mail notices to those who pre-paid tax bills last year. Mailing date will be about Au-gust 20, if his self-imposed dead-

line is met. City Collector Joe McDaniel, Jr., said preparation of city accounts is more than half complete, but he doubts the city will be able to mail all notices, as has been the policy in the past, in advance of August 31 - last day taxpayers can obtain the full two percent discount.

Citizens wishing to pre-pay one or both tax bills should visit or call the respective tax offices. What about valuation adjustments?




