Recent rains have brought Charleston's Famous Gardens to their peak of beauty. The dazzling display is expected to continue for several weeks.

C. Norwood Hastie Jr., spokesman for the trio of showplaces, said inclement weather last week discouraged sightseers, but not the blooms of stunning azaleas, camellias and a myriad of other spring flowers.

"The rain, while overabundant," he said, "has done no damage to the plants or the blooms. If anything, it has made them more impressive; I would judge this one of our best seasons in recent years."

Mr. Hastie is proprietor of Magnolia Gardens, acclaimed for its lavish offering of azaleas and camellias, considered among the finest in the country. It is especially noted for the variety of its plants, and has attracted notice from botanists and flower lovers throughout the world.

Middleton Place is considered the finest example of formal landscaping in the United States. Pre-dating the Revolution, it is compared favorably with formal gardens in England and on the continent.

Noted for its ebony lakes, surrounded by meandering paths banked with azaleas and spring flowers, Cypress Gardens derives its name from the trees, laden with Spanish moss, that rise eerily from the black waters.
