Haggai said it is imperative today that "we think in terms of living together. A whole world is at our fingertips. VA Questions And Answers

EDITOR'S NOTE: Below are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to some of the many current questions from former servicemen and their families. Further information on veterans benefits may be obtained at any VA office.

Q—How can I get in touch with a friend from the service days?

A—If you know any of the following:—his service serial number, his date of birth, his dates of entrance into and discharge from the service, the VA may be able to locate him if you have his full name, including middle name. The VA can then forward your letter to the veteran, since regulations forbid giving out a veteran's address.

Q—Phony rumors about a dividend have thousands of veterans writing the VA. What's the story on this?

A—It is an old insurance dividend paid in 1950 and 99.7 of those who were eligible have received it. The other three tenths unreachable at that time due to address change, has grown smaller during the 15 years since then due to deaths. From time to time rumors, spread that a vast horde of veterans failed to receive this dividend and VA is flooded with mail from forgotten veterans. A recent check of 14,000 such inquiries turned up only two veterans who hadn't collected.

Q—I have term insurance, which will get too expensive as I get older. What can I do?

A—You can convert all or part of it to any of six permanent plans, that have been available for a number of years. A new modified life plan became available commencing May 1, 1965. This plan requires a premium, higher than term insurance but less than ordinary life insurance, which does not increase as the

policyholder gets older. The full modified life premium is payable for life even though the amount of insurance is reduced to one-half at the policyholder's 65th birthday.

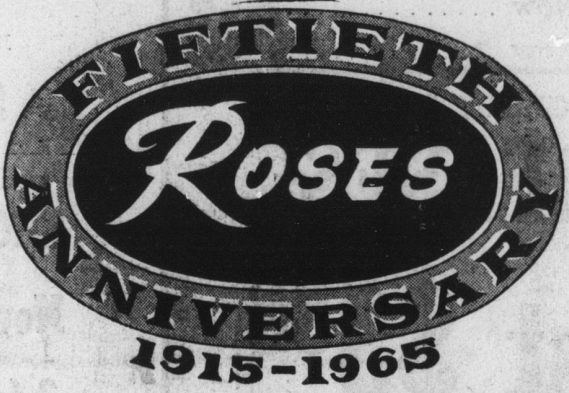
