### Heart Group Will Rename Mountain

CHAPEL HILL — New Year's Day 1966 will be "Great-grandfather's Day" in North Carolina, although the special occasion won't show up as such on 1966 calendars.

North Carolina's famous Grandfather Mountain, highest peak in the Blue Ridge Mountains, will be the subject of an "honorary rechristening" by the North Carolina Heart Association at a January 1 ceremony at the mountain top. The mountain, near Linville, will be dubbed "Great-grandfather Mountain" and will become the symbol of the state's 1966 "Hope for Hearts" Crusade — a year-long educational effort of the state heart group. The announcement was made by Hargrove Bowles, Jr., of Greensboro, State board chairman of the Heart Association.

The purpose of the New Year's Day renaming ceremony is to call public attention in North Carolina to the many great-grandfathers who are alive today as a result of progress in cardiovascular medicine and public health practice. It has been estimated that more than one-third of all human beings ever to reach the age of 90—since the beginning of recorded history—are alive today, the Heart Association points out.

Prevention of heart disease is a primary Heart Association objective, according to Bowles, and a health-savvy public is an essential part of any disease prevention effort. "The North Carolina Heart Association is really trying to live to great-grandfatherhood," the Heart Association board chairman says.

### Legion Launches New Project

Governor Dan Moore today endorsed the Legion's new project of support for U. S. assistance to the government and people of South Viet-Nam.

The American Legion is launching immediately a simple, yet eloquent and meaningful counter-pressure to the loud anti-Viet Nam, anti-draft demonstrations. The project will be entitled "Operation Show Your Colors." Department Commander J. Alvis Carver announced today.

The plan, as outlined by Commander Carver, involves the distribution of American flag lapel pins to be worn by all Americans who are in concert with the policy of the United States Government in South Viet Nam. Each flag will be accompanied by a card carrying the message: "Operation Show Your Colors—Americans Are Serving the Cause of Freedom in Viet Nam. I Wear My Country's Flag To Show That I Support Their Efforts."

The American Legion Auxiliary has pledged total support to the effort and the cards to be distributed by the Legion will bear the emblems of both The American Legion and the Auxiliary.

"It is our hope," Commander Carver said, "that we will be able to distribute literally millions of these emblems over the next several weeks and that they will be worn by loyal Americans as a symbol of American unity in support of our men and women, military and civilian, in Viet Nam."

"Demonstrations and protests against our foreign policy and the draft by a small, but exceedingly loud minority element give aid and comfort to the enemies of freedom. This is one reason for our concern."

"We must use a dignified means by which we provide visible evidence of the strength and

determination of our country and the unity of our people. We believe we have the answer," Commander Carver concluded.
