### Home Grounds Should Be Planned

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. — Home grounds are an integral part of family life. It's here a family lives and plays, and friends are entertained.

According to a Pennsylvania State University correspondence course on landscape planning, the arrangement of trees and shrubs, play spaces and service areas reflect individual tastes and compromises.

Site selection is first in home landscape planning. A satisfying view, some protection from winter's winds, good soil drainage and probably other factors are considered. If you're an avid gardener, good air drainage is needed, else late spring frosts catch your strawberries in full bloom. But there may be situations where you're willing to overlook all these items, or consider only one to the exclusion of others. For example, a rocky site on a hilltop may just suit some-

one of artistic temperament with little interest in gardening.

Home landscape planning is more inclusive than planting trees and shrubs. Penn State's correspondence course is intended to be helpful at various stages of home development including site selection, house construction, soil grading, and planting of trees and shrubs.

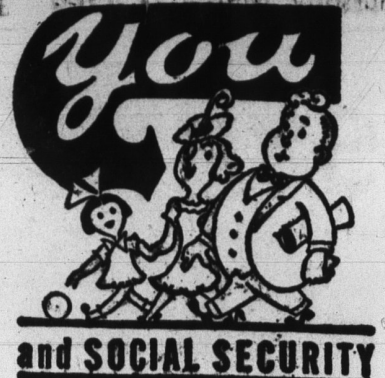
#### COMMUNION

Q—I am 57 years old and receive social security disability insurance benefits. Am I eligible for Medicare benefits?

A—No. Only persons age 65 or older will be eligible for health insurance benefits.

Q—I am 68 years of age and still working. What do I do to qualify for Medicare?

A—You need to apply if you have never applied for social security or railroad retirement benefits. And you should apply by March 31 if you want protection under both parts of Medicare when the program starts July 1.

Q—I am over 65 and receive social security benefits. If I choose not to sign up for medical insurance at this time, will I have a later opportunity to enroll?

A—Yes. There will be a general enrollment period October 1 to December 31, 1967. However, your premium rate will be higher if you wait until then to sign up.

Q—I am 70 years old and not entitled to social security benefits. I came to the United States 10 years ago, but I am not a citizen. Am I eligible for Medicare?

A—As an alien, you can be entitled to health insurance benefits if you were lawfully admitted to the U. S. for permanent residence and have lived in the United States continuously for 5 years just before the month you apply for health insurance benefits.

Q—I am over 65 but have never filed a claim for social security retirement benefits since I earn too much. Will I automatically be eligible for health insurance benefits?

A—No, you must file a claim. Visit a social security district office and bring your social security number, an estimate of your earnings for 1965, and some old documentary evidence to show how old you are.

Q—I am 65, but have never worked under social security. Am I eligible for health insurance?

A—Definitely, but you should get in touch with your social security office as soon as possible. If you do not enroll by March 31, you will not be able to sign up for medical insurance protection until October 1967, and your coverage will not be effective until July 1968. This, of course, means that any medical expense you incur between July 1966 and July 1968 will not be covered by medical insurance because you missed the first enrollment period.

Tickets are \$1.50 and may be purchased from local firemen or at the door on Saturday.

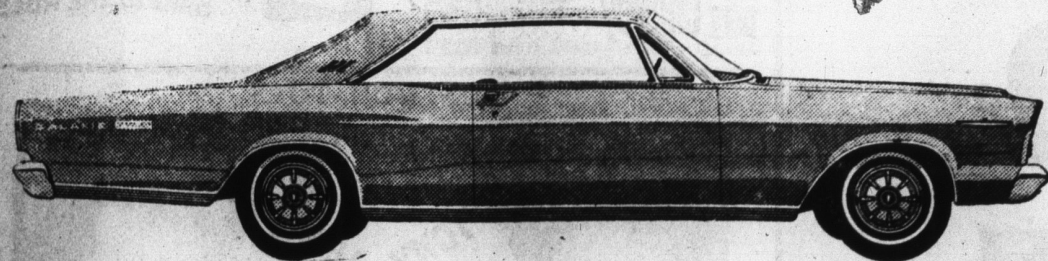

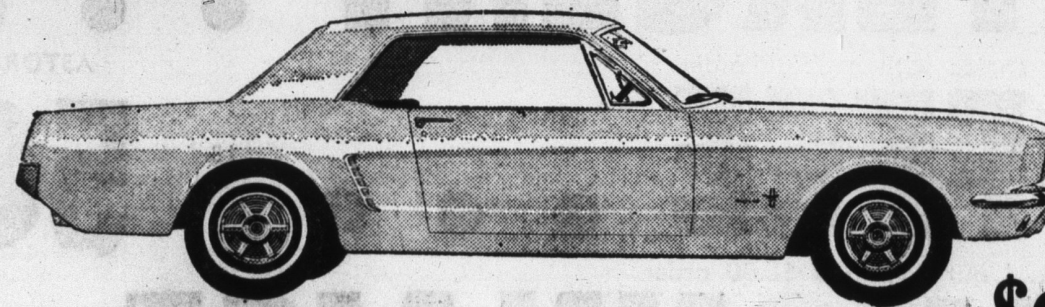
